The Liturgical Year: Christ the King

Next Sunday we will celebrate the **Solemnity of Christ the King**. This feast was established in 1925 by Pope Pius XI as a time to reflect on the reality that Christ is Lord of the Universe. In the encyclical announcing the feast, Pope Pius identified three blessings he expected to result from celebrating it. The first two have to do with government. It would remind men that the Church has a right to religious freedom and that those in power (“rulers and princes”) are to honor Christ. The third was that **“The faithful, moreover, by meditating upon these truths, will gain much strength and courage, enabling them to form their lives after the true Christian ideal.”** It is challenge to live the Faith today, and Bishop Robert Barron, one of today’s pre-eminent evangelists, identified several reasons for this when he spoke at the Convocation of Catholic Leaders. He point to **the challenges of “scientism”** – the belief that only scientific knowledge is valuable; to **“the culture of meh”** – that there is no objective truth, no objective value, rather a culture of “whatever;” and to **“a culture of self-determination”** – that freedom determines identify. He suggested three opportunities for evangelization, based on the three transcendentals: the true, the good, the beautiful. He suggested that every Catholic equip themselves with **a solid grasp of one argument for the existence of God**. Next, know and be able to discuss “radical goodness” - for example the radical embrace of Christian life in action by St. Mother Teresa. Finally, be familiar with **great examples** of what the Church has offered in **art, music, architecture, and lives**. Bishop Barron said, “Don’t tell them what to think and how to behave, show the beauty of Catholicism, and that has an evangelical power,” and he says that the beautiful draws people into considering the true and the good.

Evangelizing presupposes an active faith in our own lives. As the saying goes, “You can’t give what you don’t have.” As we prepare to celebrate the Solemnity, we can reflect on Christ’s presence in our lives. “Is Jesus Lord of every aspect of my life?” “Is there anything that I refuse to be willing to consider in light of the Church’s teaching?” “Am I willing to do whatever Jesus asks of me?” “Do I have a regular time of daily prayer?” “If someone looked at my calendar and my budget, what would seem to be my priorities in life? Could they tell that my faith mattered to me?” A traditional prayer to Christ the King can be said: *O Christ Jesus, acknowledge Thee to be the King of the universe: all that has been made is created for Thee. Exercise over me all Thy sovereign rights. I hereby renew the promises of my Baptism, renouncing Satan and all his works and pomps, and I engage myself to lead henceforth a truly Christian life. And in an especial manner do I undertake to bring about the triumph of the rights of God and Thy Church, so far as in me lies. Divine Heart of Jesus, I offer Thee my poor actions to obtain the acknowledgment by every heart of Thy sacred Kingly power. In such wise may the kingdom of Thy peace be firmly established throughout all the earth. Amen.*
