Celebrating the Saints: St. Jane Frances de Chantal

Do you think of saints as real people with real friends? **St. Jane Frances de Chantal was a friend of St. Francis de Sales, patron of the Diocese of Baker.** Together she and St. Francis founded the Visitation Order, intending that the sisters would be examples of the joyful humility and meekness seen in Mary's visit to Elizabeth. Their goal was to establish a new religious life: one open to older women and those with more delicate health, not able to live the austerities of traditional orders. When St. Francis de Sales died in 1622, there were 13 convents. When St. Jane died in 1641, there were 86!

However, St. Jane's life isn't just an example of a religious sister. St. Jane had **married at age 21** and then was **widowed just seven years later**. She experienced the challenges of these states in life: financial difficulties, childbearing (she had six children, three of whom died in infancy), and childrearing (she worried about a daughter's materialism, for example), grief at the death of her husband when he was killed in a hunting accident, the struggle to forgive his killer. As both wife and widow, she devoted herself to charitable service as well as prayer. Several years after being widowed, she met **St. Francis de Sales**, who became her spiritual director, and **he helped her in the challenges of her state in life, helping her grow in prayer and virtue in the sufferings she experienced.** After her children were settled as adults, she was able to enter religious life as **foundress and one of the first members of the Visitation Order.**

St. Jane Frances de Chantal's feast day is celebrated on August 12. It is a great day to reflect on our response to sufferings and difficulties. Do I use difficult circumstances and sufferings as opportunities to turn to God in prayer and the sacraments and grow closer to him? Or do I think that I could be holier if only my circumstances were different? Am I willing to persevere in efforts to grow in holiness, knowing it is a process, or do I expect it to be effortless and happen quickly? What can I commit to this week to change my attitude or to grow in my relationship with God?

Now I rejoice in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I am filling up what is lacking in the afflictions of Christ on behalf of his body, which is the Church. (Col 1:24)

Have you ever either told someone to "offer it up" or had someone told you to offer it up? What does this saying mean to you? We all suffering at some point in our lives. Some sufferings are little and others are true tragedies. We want suffering to make sense or to have meaning. Dr. Scott Hahn, scripture scholar, convert, and theologian, helps make sense out of suffering by drawing on the wisdom and insight of scripture. In the engaging audio presentation "**Making Sense Our of Suffering**," Dr. Hahn helps us find the meaning of our suffering and shows us how to unite it to Christ's suffering on the Cross.
