Celebrating the Saints: St. Francis de Sales

St. Francis de Sales is patron saint of the Diocese of Baker. His feast day is **January 24**. St. Francis worked in Geneva, a bastion of Calvinism after the Protestant Reformation. His goal was to convert 60,000 people back to Catholicism. Though he was said to be a great preacher, he had a difficult time in getting non-Catholics to listen to him, so he printed tracts regarding the faith. This is one of the first instances of using printed matter for evangelization. Francis became the bishop of Geneva, and it is said that over 40,000 people were converted to Catholicism through his efforts.

Francis had a special concern for the formation of lay people and taught that **all people are called to holiness**. In Ch. 3 of his book *Introduction to the Devout Life* St. Francis de Sales says, *It is an error, indeed, a very heresy, to seek to banish the devout life from the soldier's guardroom, the mechanic's workshop, the prince's court, or the domestic hearth. Of course a purely contemplative devotion, such as is specially proper to the religious and monastic life, cannot be practiced in these outer vocations, but there are various other kinds of devotion well-suited to lead those whose calling is secular, along the paths of perfection.* He emphasizes, *"A different exercise of devotion is required of each—the noble, the artisan, the servant, the prince, the maiden, and the wife; and furthermore such practice must be modified according to the strength, the calling, and the duties of each individual...would it be fitting that a bishop should seek to lead the solitary life of a Carthusian? And if the father of a family were as regardless in making provision for the future as a Capuchin...would not such a devotion be ridiculous, ill-regulated, and intolerable? ... that which runs counter to the rightful vocation of anyone is, you may be sure, a spurious devotion."*

In this teaching, St. Francis de Sales anticipates Vatican II's emphasis on the universal call to holiness — everyone **who is baptized is called to holiness**. (CCC #871-872). He also anticipates its teaching that the vocation of lay people is to be holy in the world, transforming the temporal order (CCC #898), acting as leaven in the world (AA #2), "...using the spiritual aids...especially active participation in the sacred liturgy...while correctly fulfilling their secular duties in the ordinary conditions of life..." "Neither family concerns nor other secular affairs should be irrelevant to their spiritual life" (AA #4) (Note CCC—*Catechism of the Catholic Church*; AA — *Apostolicam Actuositatem/Decree on the Apostolate of the Laity*). Two areas of reflection present themselves:

- Do I believe that all baptized people — whether lay or ordained — are called to the same holiness? What do I do to pursue holiness in my life? What things are obstacles to my holiness?
- Do I believe that as a lay person my vocation is aimed at "transforming the temporal order?" Do I see the duties of my state in life as an important part of my spiritual life? Do I work to build Christ's kingdom in my family, with my friends, at work, in society?
