#### <u>Excerpts From Conflict to Communion:</u> <u>Lutheran-Catholic Common Commemoration</u> <u>of the Reformation</u>

By the Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity and the Lutheran World Federation

In 2017, Catholic and Lutheran Christians will most fittingly look back on events that occurred 500 years earlier by **putting the gospel of Jesus Christ at the center.** The gospel should be celebrated and communicated to the people of our **time so that the world may believe that God gives Godself to human beings and calls us into communion with Godself and God's church**. Herein lies the basis for **our joy in our common faith**.

#### **Five Ecumenical Imperatives**

238. Catholics and Lutherans **realize that they** and the communities in which they live out their faith **belong to the one body of Christ.** 

**The first imperative**: Catholics and Lutherans should always **begin from the perspective of unity** and not from the point of view of division in order to strengthen what is held in common even though the differences are more easily seen and experienced.

The second imperative: Lutherans and Catholics must let themselves continuously be transformed by the encounter with the other and by the mutual witness of faith.

The third imperative: Catholics and Lutherans should again commit themselves to seek visible unity, to elaborate together what this means in concrete steps, and to strive repeatedly toward this goal.

The fourth imperative: Lutherans and Catholics should jointly rediscover the power of the gospel of Jesus Christ for our time.

The fifth imperative: Catholics and Lutherans should witness together to the mercy of God in proclamation and service to the world.

245. ... the Joint Declaration on the Doctrine of Justification describes: "Lutherans and Catholics share the goal of confessing Christ in all things, who alone is to be trusted above all things as the one Mediator (1 Tim. 2:5f) through whom God in the Holy Spirit gives himself and pours out his renewing gifts" (JDDJ 18).

### <u>Get FORMED — The Reformation and more</u>

FORMED.org lists a number of resources to reflect on the Reformation. Audios include "Understanding Luther" to another audio "Heroes of the Catholic Reformation." "Reformation" is available as a video, and "Characters of the Reformation" is a downloadable book. Take time to understand the factors that contributed to the Reformation as well as to reflect on those saints who furthered the Catholic Counter Reformation. St. Francis de Sales, patron of this diocese, was one such defender of the faith. As bishop of Geneva he was dedicated to working with Calvinists and helping them find their way back to the Catholic faith. In one of the tracts he wrote, he said, "I well know, thank God, that Tradition was before all Scripture, since a good part of Scripture itself is only Tradition reduced to writing. with an infallible assistance of the Holy Spirit. But, since the authority of Scripture is more easily received by the reformers than that of Tradition." This is a good reminder to all of us as we work for Christian unity.
