Celebrating the Saints: St. John Vianney

After a challenging path to the priesthood, **St. John** Vianney, also known as the Cure d' Ars', was ordained and sent to a rural village where many of the people were ignorant of or indifferent to religion; many were very comfortable with a lifestyle at odds with a life of faith. He came to be known for his **great** dedication to the spiritual welfare of souls, particularly for his incredible dedication to confes**sion.** In the winter, he would hear confessions for 11-12 hours per day, and in the summer, as many as 16 hours per day! Of course, he could only stay this busy because people came to him for the sacrament. He became so well-known as a confessor that people began to make pilgrimages specifically to go to confession. It has been said that the number grew to be as many as 20,000 pilgrims per year. Pope St. John XXIII wrote an **encyclical** for the 100th anniversary of this saint's death, urging all priests "...to devote all their attention to a consideration of the wonderful example of this holy man..." calling him "an outstanding model of priestly asceticism, of piety,...and...of pastoral zeal." He exhorted "...all of the faithful to offer constant prayers to God for their priests, so that each in his own way may help them to attain **holiness**," and instructed the laity to "be even more zealous and active in offering to help them." Finally, he urged "**Let Christian families** consider it one of their most sublime privileges to give priests to the Church; and so let them offer their sons to the sacred ministry with joy and gratitude." Named patron of parish priests, particularly pastors, by Pope Pius XI, "to promote their spiritual welfare..." St. John Vianney's feast day is August 4. Take a minute to reflect on how you support our pastor. Do you pray for him regularly? Do you help build up the life of the parish by your weekly participation at Mass and your financial support? Are you active in the life of the parish, participating in social events as well as formation events and work projects?

I love You, O my God, and my only desire is to love You until the last breath of my life.

I love You, O my infinitely lovable God, and I would rather die loving You, than live without loving You.

I love You, Lord, and the only grace I ask it to love

You eternally...

My God, if my tongue cannot say in every moment that I love You, I want my heart to repeat it to You as often as I draw breath.
