#### Spending Time with Jesus

Someone is needed for adoration from 3-4 pm on Wednesdays, and additional hours will be opening up this fall. This is time to be up-close and personal with Jesus face-to-face with him — bringing him your joys and your sorrows, listening to him and what it is he wants for you. LifeTeen makes these recommendations in "A Beginner's Guide to Adoration": 1) Be patient. Maybe you aren't ready to commit to a whole hour, but you could drop in for 15 minutes a week. 2) Bring Scripture. As Fr. Hank said in last week's homily, praying Scripture before the Blessed Sacrament is an opportunity for great insights and spiritual growth. 3) Pray the Rosary. Let Jesus' mother help you know him better. 4) Listen to sacred music (earphones, please!). For some Gregorian chant can be a real asset to prayers; for others, praise and worship music is a way to pray. 5)Be okay with silence. Allow yourself to sit in silence with Jesus. # **Knowing the Saints**

This week, there are two important feast days: the feast of the **Passion of St. John the Baptist** (8/30), and the feast of **St. Augustine of Hippo**, Bishop and Doctor of the Church (8/29). Their lives both reinforce the importance of commitment to **Truth.** 

Jesus said, "I tell you, among those born of women, no one is greater than John ... " (Lk 7:28). St. John the Evangelist wrote, "A man named John was sent from God... to testify to the light, so that all might believe..." (Jn. 1:6-7). St. John the Baptist lived a simple life, eating locusts and wild honey and dressing in camel's hair (Mt 3:4). Throughout his life, he pointed to the need to reform one's life. John baptized Jesus and later pointed to him as the "Lamb of God." Later John said, "He must increase; I must decrease" (Jn. 3:30). John's purpose in life was to make a path to Jesus (cf. Jun 1:23-27), and he was beheaded because he refused to condone sexual immorality, that is Herod's adulterous cohabitation with his wife's brother. Herodias (Mt 14:3-5), who then used her daughter to ask for John's head on a platter (Mt 14:10-11). Though he was not asked to denv Christ explicitly, he was martyred for his witness to Christ who is Truth. As St. Bede put it, "St. John, for Christ, gave up his life, even though [his persecutor] had not demanded that he should deny Jesus Christ, but only that he should keep silent about the truth. And he did not keep silent about the truth, and thus he died for Christ who is the Truth."

St. Augustine lived a life very different than that of St. John the Baptist for many years. Though he had been brought up as a Christian, he **drifted away from the** Faith, going so far as to embrace heresy. He loved comfort and pleasure and had a long-time relationship with a woman, living with her outside of marriage, and they had a child together. Despite what might have looked like satisfaction with life on the outside, St. Augustine was restless. Probably his most famous quote is, ""You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in you." In his seeking, in his recognition of the need to change his life, he said, "Unlearned people are taking Heaven by force, while we, with all our knowledge, are so cowardly that we keep rolling around in the mud of our sins!" As he struggled to live chastely, he praved, "Grant me chastity and continence... but not yet." The turning point was when he heard, "Take and read," and understood this to be God telling him to read Scripture. He opened the bible to Romans 13:13-14: "Let us conduct ourselves becomingly as in the day, not in reveling and drunkenness, not in debauchery and licentiousness, not in guarreling and jealousy. But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires." This struck him deeply, and he began to change his life, eventually

becoming a priest, then a bishop. He was a prolific writer, and is known as both a Father of the Church and a Doctor of the Church.

Today we are faced with many challenges regarding the Truth about marriage and family life, about sexuality and gender, and about the sanctity of life. In 2012, Pope Benedict said, "...celebrating the martyrdom of St. John the Baptist also reminds us — Christians in our own times — that we cannot give into compromise when it comes to our love for Christ, for his Word, for his Truth. The Truth is the Truth; there is no compromise. The Christian life requires, as it were, the 'martyrdom' of daily fidelity to the Gospel; the courage, that is, to allow Christ to increase in us and to direct our thoughts and actions. But this can only occur in our lives if our relationship with God is strong." St. Augustine an St. John the Baptist would both agree.

#### **Get FORMED**

**New: September Liturgical Calendar** Each month, FORMED presents a calendar with recommendations of materials to read, study, listen to, or watch, corresponding with the liturgical year. Recommendations for adult and youth materials and for both Spanish and English content are made. The September calendar is included on the insert, as well as information on how to register with FORMED. If you aren't registered for FORMED, take a minute to do so. The parish subscription makes this resource available to at no personal expense. FORMED provides great information regarding the Catholic faith. but it is also designed to help each person develop a daily habit of formation and prayer, to grow in their spiritual life. If you are talking to a Catholic who is attending another Church at this time, encourage them to browse through the information. When sharing the code and inviting others to use this resource, it is most helpful if you can make a specific recommendation for them to look at or listen to. This means it is important to become familiar with the resources on the site. Remember, new items are added regularly, so keep checking back.
