The Transfiguration of the Lord

“...Jesus took with Him Peter, James and his brother John, and led them up a high mountain by themselves. And He was transfigured before them, and His clothes became dazzling white, such as no fuller on earth could bleach them. Then Elijah appeared to them along with Moses, and they were conversing with Jesus.” -Mk 9:2-4

Why do Moses and Elijah appear on the mountain?

Moses and Elijah represent the two principal components of the Old Testament: the Law and the Prophets. Moses was the giver of the Law and Elijah was considered the greatest of the prophets.

The fact that these two figures “spoke of His departure, which He was to accomplish at Jerusalem” illustrates that the Law and the Prophets point forward to the Messiah and His sufferings.

Christ’s Transfiguration aims at strengthening the Apostles’ faith in anticipation of His Passion: the ascent onto the ‘high mountain’ prepares for the ascent to Calvary and manifests what His Body contains and radiates in the Sacraments: ‘the hope of glory’ (CCC 568).
